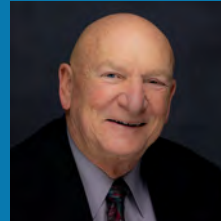
The Mayor and Florence City Council are elected on a non-partisan basis. The Mayor is elected every four years and city council is elected every two years.

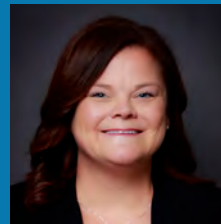

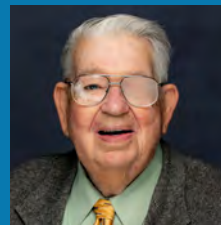

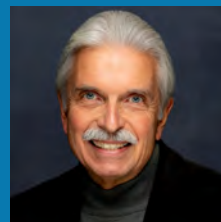

CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

The City of Florence operates under a Mayor/Council form of government, with the Mayor as the Chief Executive Officer and six council members serving as the legislative body.

Regular meetings provide a unique opportunity for community members to stay informed and engaged in the decisions that shape our city. Special meetings may be called as needed and will be announced as prescribed by law within twenty-four hours. All council meetings are open to the public.

Regular meetings of the Florence City Council occur on the first and third Tuesdays (Caucus Meetings) and the second and fourth Tuesdays (Business Meetings) of each month. Regular meetings begin at 6:00pm at the Florence Government Center Council Chamber, 8100 Ewing Blvd., Florence, Kentucky.

Agendas and Minutes of the Florence City Council meetings are posted via the City of Florence website under City Council – Agendas & Minutes. Meeting minutes for business and special meetings are posted once the minutes are approved by Florence City Council. Agendas are posted twenty-four hours in advance of the meeting.

Those who cannot make it to Florence City Council meetings in person can still stay connected with the proceedings. Council meetings are live-streamed on the city's official YouTube channel, allowing you to tune in from the comfort of your home. Additionally, Spectrum Cable Subscribers can watch on Channel 422, and Altafiber subscribers on Channel 822.

This impressive achievement is a testament to the department's unwavering commitment to excellence and its pivotal role in ensuring the financial stability and prosperity of the city.

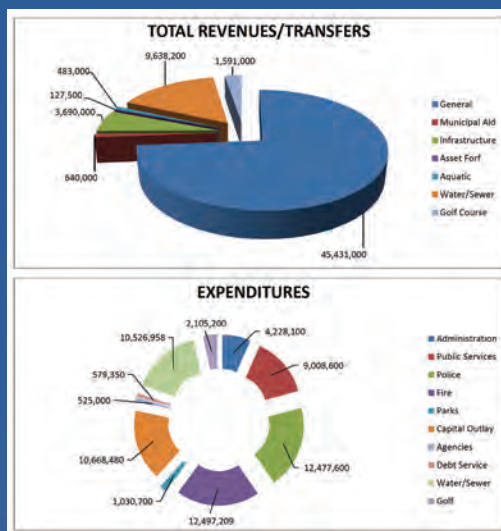
The mission of the Finance Department is to provide timely and accurate accounting and financial support to all city departments and the elected officials of the City of Florence in an efficient and economical manner. This mission serves as the bedrock for the efficient and economical management of the city's finances and plays a critical role in Florence's fiscal health. In turn, this has created a vibrant and prosperous city that continues to attract residents and businesses alike.





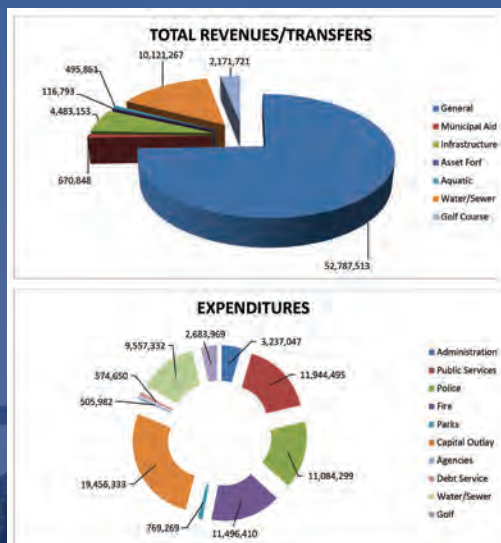
FY 2023-2024 BUDGET

The projected revenues for FY 2024 represent a 7% decrease under the prior FY 2023 amended revenues. This is mainly due to the decrease in ARPA grant funds. However, the city is still projecting increases in its core revenues. The projected expenditures/expenses represents a 36% decrease under the amended FY 2023 budget. The overall decrease is a result of the reduction of capital outlay in the General fund for city projects. Departmental capital outlay is still budgeted as anticipated. Inflationary concerns continue to top the list of issues facing the city. Staffing issues, as far as attraction and retention, continue to be a major concern. The city has been successful in dealing with budget realities in a positive manner to remain fiscally sound.



FY 2022-2023 ACTUAL

As of the close of the current fiscal year, the city's governmental funds reported a combined ending fund balance of \$112,966,349. This was a decrease of \$3,314,285 in comparison to the prior year and mostly contributed to capital outlay expenditures in the General fund. The city's proprietary funds reported a combined ending net position of \$39,868,893. This was an increase of \$7,024,256 in comparison to the prior year. The increases in both funds were due to transfers/capital contributions for various projects. Net capital assets for the city amounted to \$136,718,013. In contrast, outstanding debt for the city is \$2,430,000.

Since its founding in 1936, the Florence Fire/EMS Department has been dedicated to the safety and well-being of the Florence community and the Florence Fire Protection District. 2023 marked a year filled with accomplishments, recognition, expansion, and dedication to ensuring the safety and well-being of our community.

This year, our firefighters and EMS personnel received well-deserved recognition for their exceptional dedication and bravery.

At the Northern Kentucky Firefighter's Association Awards Banquet, the department was presented with the Fire Department of the Year Rescue Award for C-Shift's actions at a fire and received the Monica Rath Emergency Medical Services Award to B-Shift Engine 32 and Squad 32 for their treatment of a medical emergency. Members of Florence Fire/EMS were recognized multiple times by St. Elizabeth



Medical Center for the fastest “Door to Needle Time” for the treatment of stroke patients and received the Mission Lifeline Award by the American Heart Association. These honors highlight the department’s outstanding service and unwavering commitment to safety.

Recognizing the growing demand for emergency medical services, the Florence Fire/EMS added a new engine and two new ambulances.

These additions ensure we can continue to provide top-notch medical care to our residents and visitors during peak demand times. The department also welcomed several new personnel, promoted within the ranks, and bid farewell to retirees.

One of the most significant milestones in 2023 was a groundbreaking ceremony for the new state-of-the-art fire station. This station is set to be completed in 2024 and will enhance the department’s ability to respond swiftly to emergencies and serve as a symbol of our dedication to the community’s safety.

In 2024, the Florence Fire/EMS will remain committed to its mission of protecting and serving the community and looks forward to a future filled with continued growth and excellence in public safety.

The Florence Public Service Department, comprising of 67 dedicated professionals, is deeply committed to improving the quality of life for residents, businesses, and visitors. Guided by the vision of “Better Services, Better Community,” the department is organized into nine key divisions responsible for city infrastructure and services.

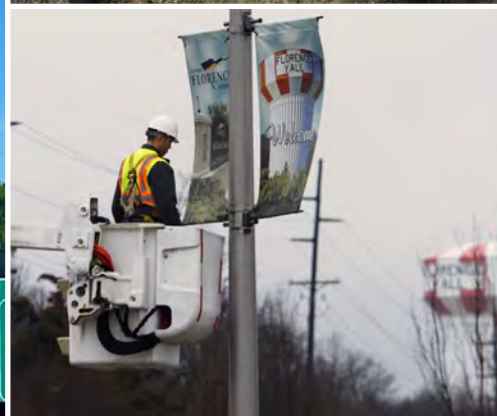
The City of Florence Infrastructure Support Services (I.S.S.) consists of four areas: capital improvement projects, regulatory compliance, asset management, and technology. These components work together to manage the city's transportation, parks, facilities, water distribution, sewer systems, and stormwater conveyance.



The Community Support Services Division administers city ordinances, property maintenance code, and zoning regulations, handling over 4,000 complaints annually. They also remove over 3,000 illegal signs and conduct about 10 post-site plan reviews, utilizing code enforcement and GIS mapping software.

Public Services Operations is comprised of six divisions, responsible for maintaining city vehicles, properties, roads, parks, sanitary sewer mains, and water mains. They operate a 24/7 on-call system for emergencies such as water main breaks, sewer issues, and snow events, ensuring efficient responses.

The core values of the Public Services Department include exceptional customer service, professionalism, clean environments, efficient infrastructure management, rapid emergency response, and superior community amenities. Their dedication makes our community a better place to live, work, and play.

Florence/Boone County Skate Park

8100 EWING BOULEVARD

The Florence/Boone County Skate Park is an impressive 22,000-square-foot park designed for in-line skates, rollerblades, and skateboards. One of the most appealing aspects of the Florence/Boone County Skate Park is its thoughtful design, catering to a range of skill levels. The park has areas for beginner, intermediate, and advanced skaters with various challenging elements. Beyond the terrain, the park has a shelter and spectator area for friends and family to watch their favorite skater. There is no fee to enter, so grab your skates or board, invite your friends, and experience the thrill of the only concrete skate park in our area.



Florence Community Plaza

8100 MALL ROAD

The Florence Community Plaza Park is dedicated to the public servants who have worked for the citizens of the City of Florence. The land was donated by Tom Green in 2016 for the sole purpose of

serving the community. As you explore the park, you will find statutes paying homage to our Police, Fire/EMS, Public Service, and Administration Departments, each a testament to their selfless service to our city. The brick pavers encircling the park bear the names of retiring public employees, forever etching their legacy into the foundation of our community.



Florence Nature Park: A Natural Oasis

7200 NATURE PARK DRIVE

With 15 acres, Florence Nature Park stands out with its picturesque walking trails and the Evelyn M. Kalb Gathering House and Nature Park Event Center located off Banklick Street. Acquired by the city in 1986, this park is not only a nature lover's dream, it is also a perfect place for hosting indoor events. The Florence Nature Park has paved walking trails for exploring nature with over 2,800 linear feet of asphalt walkways. The granite animals in the park were donated by the Florence Mall when the park was under construction.

For indoor events, the Evelyn M. Kalb Gathering House and Nature Park Event Center offer a cozy setting for events and rentals, making it an excellent choice for weddings, meetings, and special occasions. Tours of the facility are conducted by appointment.



Kentaboo Park

418 KENTABOO DRIVE

Opened in 2020, Kentaboo Park is the city's newest active park, boasting a tropical theme. Located on Kentaboo Avenue, the three-acre park features open green space to unwind, a playground for little ones, and a basketball court so you can challenge your friends to a game or test your agility in a four-square match.



Lincoln Woods Park

1 CITY PARK DRIVE

Sports enthusiasts can head to Lincoln Woods Park, where you will find baseball fields, tennis courts, and a basketball court. The land for this park was acquired by the city in 1959 as part of the water treatment plant land acquisition. The 15-acre park was developed in 1972 and is perfect for both organized sports events and casual pick-up games. Additionally, a colorful playground ensures the kids have a blast while you enjoy your favorite sports, and a wooded area with dirt trails keeps you connected to nature.

Niblack Memorial Park

7431 U.S. ROUTE 42

Niblack Memorial Park is a 4.5-acre neighborhood park on the site of the former city building. Providing a large green space and walking trail, the park is conveniently located next to the Deanna and Hugh Skees Senior Activity Center.



Orleans Park

8400 ST. LOUIS BOULEVARD

Acquired in 2002, Fischer Development donated 9.5 acres, and the city purchased an adjoining 1.5 acres to create this active 11-acre park. Situated in the Orleans North subdivision on the west side of the city, the park features a playground, basketball court, green open space for an athletic field, sand volleyball court, asphalt paved walking trail, and walking bridge leading to a sled hill for those winter months! For fishing enthusiasts, bring your pole and catch a few fish in the stocked lake, following the catch-and-release rule.



South Fork Park

If you are looking for some outdoor adventure and recreation, South Fork Park is the place to be. South Fork Park is our largest city park, encompassing 42 acres, and is home to our nine-hole disc golf course. The beautifully landscaped sand volleyball courts and well-maintained concrete basketball courts are sure to fill your day with plenty of exercise. For those seeking a more peaceful experience, the walking path features natural wooded and meadow areas. Our pedestrian bridge, which crosses over Gunpowder Creek, is a favorite for family photos. The calm,

picturesque scene, punctuated by the sounds of nature, creates a haven for relaxation and meditation. The mounded earthen sculpture along the walking path is constructed of topsoil and ideal for sledding on snow days!

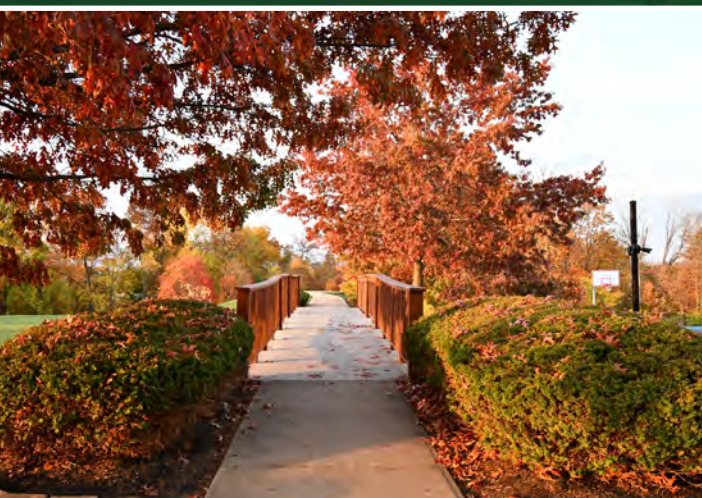

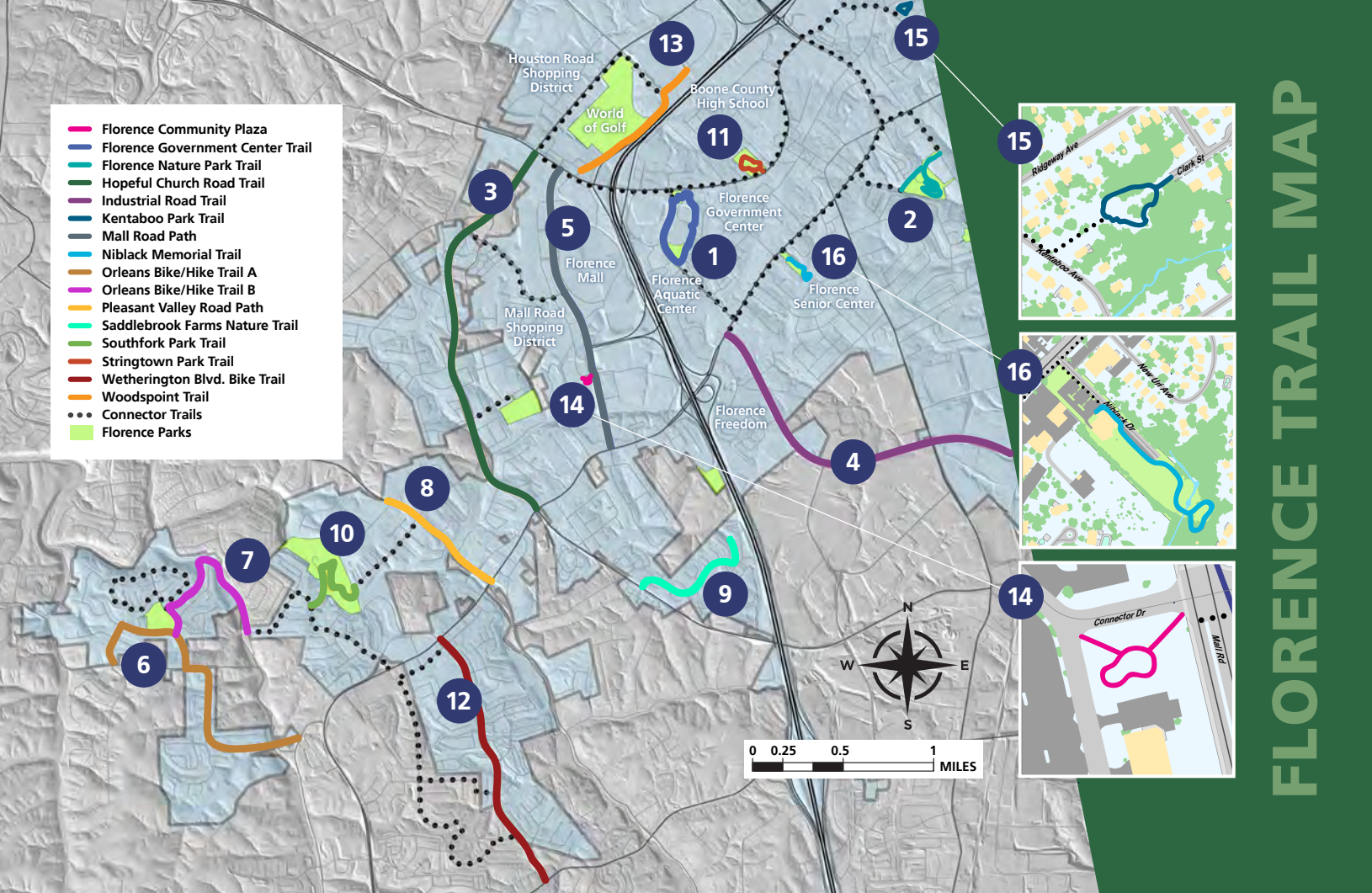

3. Organized a comprehensive community forestry program.

This event is open to the public, so friends, family, and neighbors are all welcome to attend.

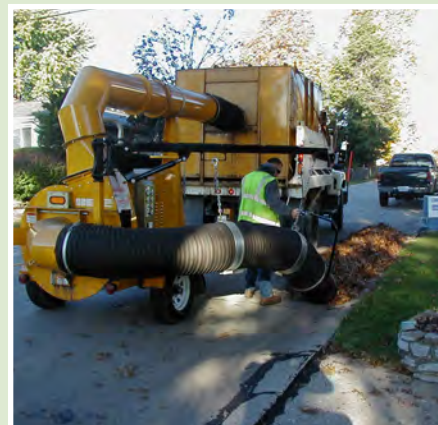
Fall Cleanup Week

The city appoints one member of the commission, which operates, improves, extends, supervises, manages, and controls sources of water supply to the City of Florence and Boone County Water District.



NORTHERN KENTUCKY REGIONAL ETHICS COMMITTEE

The city is a part of the Northern Kentucky Regional Ethics Authority, which was created through an Interlocal Agreement and promotes ethical practices in local government.



BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT AND ZONING APPEALS

Empowered to grant condition use permits and dimensional variances from zoning regulations within the City of Florence.



URBAN FOREST COMMISSION

Focuses on the preservation, maintenance, and expansion of our urban green spaces.



CODE ENFORCEMENT BOARD

The board hears appeals such as property maintenance violations, zoning violations, and parking citations, enforcing local codes and regulations to maintain community standards.



VETERANS COMMISSION

Our newest commission, dedicated to addressing issues that affect our local veterans.

FLORENCE'S ESSENTIAL SERVICES

Florence stands as a shining example of a community that values its residents' well-being.

With efficient snow removal, a top-notch recycling center, biannual cleanups, and cost-effective garbage rates through Rumpke, Florence ensures its residents have access to essential services that make daily life easier and more enjoyable. In Florence, quality living is not just a slogan; it is a way of life.

SNOW REMOVAL ON CITY STREETS

When winter blankets Florence in a layer of snow, residents and businesses can rest easy knowing the city has their back!

The Florence Public Services Department works diligently to ensure the city's roads are clear and safe. During a snow emergency, the City of Florence asks its residents for assistance during the snow removal operation by moving parked vehicles off the streets when snow is expected. Florence has one level of snow emergency status, and the primary radio and television stations are notified when the city has declared a snow emergency. In such instances, all on-street parking is prohibited for a period of 24 hours.

GARBAGE AND RECYCLING PROGRAMS

GARBAGE COLLECTION

Rumpke, a trusted waste management company, is the authorized provider of low-cost garbage collection services in Florence. This agreement allows residents to enjoy high-quality waste removal services without breaking the bank. Affordable garbage rates make it easier for families to maintain a clean and healthy living environment. Call Rumpke at (877) 786-7537 to initiate service at your residence or business.

RECYCLING PICK-UP

The City of Florence offers a voluntary subscription recycling program for residents, also through Rumpke. Residents are billed directly from Rumpke for this service, and residential curbside pickup occurs on the same day as trash pickup.

Our contract does not include commercial and industrial recycling, but Rumpke does offer such service. Please contact Rumpke at (877) 786-7537 for commercial and industrial rates or to set up service.

RECYCLING DROP-OFF

Florence takes pride in its commitment to sustainability and offers a drop-off recycling program at the city's Recycling Center. Located at the Public Services Maintenance Facility, 7850 Tanners Lane, residents can drop off recyclables such as paper, cardboard, plastic, glass, and more, making it easy to reduce waste and promote eco-friendly practices. ANNUAL LEAF COLLECTION

The Florence Public Services Department conducts its annual Leaf Collection Program for City of Florence residents from mid-October to mid-December. A sign will be placed at the subdivision/street entrances the day before leaf collection. Schedule is based on weather and equipment operation. All leaves are treated and used as compost or fertilizer.

GUIDELINES FOR COLLECTION

- Rake leaves in a row behind the curb. Do not rake into the street. Leaves must be raked to the curb by 7:00am the morning of the scheduled pick-up.
- Pick-up is on residential streets only. No state routes or commercial streets.
- Keep all debris and trash out of the leaf row. This includes tree branches.
- Homeowners may also bag leaves for pick-up by Rumpke.

CHRISTMAS TREECYCLING

Wondering what to do with your live tree after the holidays? The city offers curbside tree pickup, during which crews from the Public Services Department drive around the city and pick up Christmas trees placed at the curbside for recycling.

When you hit the road in Florence, have you ever wondered if you are driving on a city, county, or state road?

CITY ROADS

These roads are maintained by the local city or municipality and are typically found within city limits. Examples of roads maintained by the City of Florence include Farmview Drive, Wellington Blvd., Bustetter Drive, and Mall Road.

COUNTY ROADS

Managed by the county government, these roads connect areas outside city limits, serving as connectors between cities, and rural regions within the county. A few examples are Aero Parkway, Camp Ernst Road, and Cayton Road.

STATE ROADS

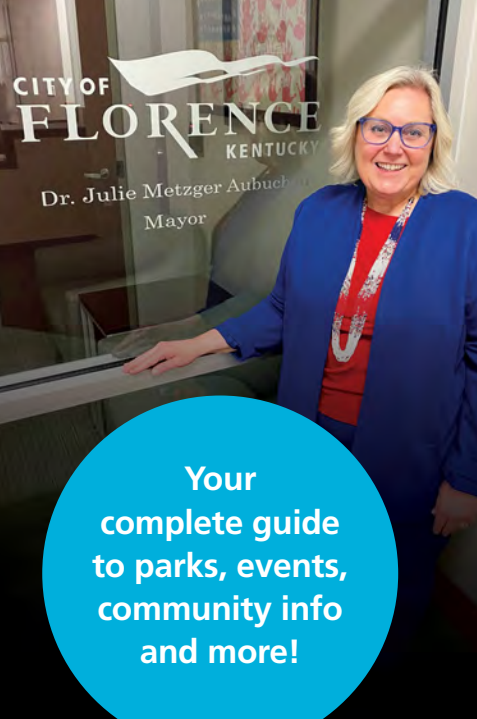
State roads, also known as highways, are under state government jurisdiction and often connect regions within the state, spanning across multiple cities and counties. Examples of state-maintained roads are KY 18, US 42, Hopeful Church Road, Houston Road, Weaver Road, Turfway Road, and Dixie Highway.

Being able to differentiate between these road types is crucial when reporting maintenance concerns to the appropriate authorities. It ensures the right government agency is informed, leading to a more effective response and quicker resolution of road-related issues.
