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CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

The City of Florence operates under a Mayor/Council form of government, with the Mayor as the Chief Executive Officer and six councilmembers serving as the legislative body.

Regular meetings provide a unique opportunity for community members to stay informed and engaged in the decisions that shape our city. Special meetings may be called as needed and will be announced as prescribed by law within twenty-four hours. All council meetings are open to the public.

Florence City Council meets regularly on the first and third Tuesdays (Caucus Meetings) and the second and fourth Tuesdays (Business Meetings) of each month. Regular meetings begin at 6:00 p.m. at the Florence Government Center, Council Chamber, 8100 Ewing Blvd., Florence, Kentucky. While meetings are typically held weekly, except for the fifth Tuesday of any month, the schedule may be adjusted for holidays, events or in the absence of legislative items. For the most current information on Florence City Council meetings, please visit the official city website.

Agendas and Minutes of the city council meetings are posted via the official City of Florence website under City Council - Agendas & Minutes. Meeting minutes for business and special meetings are posted once the minutes are approved by Florence City Council. Agendas are posted twenty-four hours in advance of the meeting.

Those who cannot make it to Florence City Council meetings in person can still stay connected with the proceedings. Council meetings are live streamed on the city's official YouTube channel, allowing you to tune in from the comfort of your home. Additionally, Spectrum Cable Subscribers can watch on Channel 422 and Altafiber subscribers on Channel 822.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

At the core of any vibrant community is healthy economic growth.

The City of Florence is committed to supporting this backbone of the community structure by creating opportunities for the establishment of new businesses as well as the expansion of those currently within the community. Overall, our goal is to enhance the quality of life for all of those residing in the city, as well as creating a welcoming environment for those who choose to visit. As we reflect upon the past year, and look ahead into 2025, the future of Economic Development in Florence is bright.

Over the course of the past year, Florence has noted the opening of twenty-four new businesses, along with the ongoing construction of twelve large scale projects. Additionally, there are more than eight potential developments at various stages of the planning process. The culmination of these projects represents over \$300 million in new capital investment being brought to the city, speaking to the strong business community we have created in Florence.

2024 data reflects Florence continues to maintain one of the highest occupancy rates in our region, boasting a 93% occupancy of our buildings among all business sectors, including commercial, office and industrial. This statistic highlights the robust and diverse business climate within our community, making Florence a desirable location for entrepreneurs, investors and businesses alike.

Significant achievements occurred within our community in 2024, and we are well positioned to carry this momentum forward into 2025. Our elected officials and staff remain committed to overseeing positive economic growth in Florence, bringing the best job opportunities, housing options, and services possible to our residents.

Throughout 2024, the Administration Department continued to play a critical role in Florence's ongoing growth, ensuring smooth governance, and maintaining strong community relations.

Serving as the main support division for the Mayor and Florence City Council, the Administration Department ensures that the city operates seamlessly.

As we look ahead, the Administration Department remains dedicated to preserve strong public relations, promote economic growth, and ensure the well-being of our community. We are excited about the future initiatives and continued discussions on new developments that will shape our city's future.

Scope of responsibilities include:



ECONOMIC AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT:

By focusing on opportunities that benefit both businesses and residents, our economic development team plays an active role in cultivating local commerce. In 2024, economic development was a top priority, highlighted by several significant achievements: the successful opening of Emerge IT, which brought 50 new full-time jobs, and the Amazon Last Mile Facility, adding 150 new positions. New businesses including Wingstop and Drury Plaza Hotel also established locations, further strengthening Florence's business landscape. Additionally, the department oversees all zoning matters within the city, ensuring developments align with Florence's long-term vision while maintaining regulatory compliance. The department also facilitates the application process for occupational and ABC licenses, making it easier for businesses to establish and excel in our community.

CITY CLERK: As the official custodian of city records, the City Clerk ensures the proper maintenance, preservation and accessibility of all permanent records while complying with the Kentucky Open Records Act to maintain transparency and accountability in all municipal operations. Additionally, the City Clerk handles the publication of legal notices, ensuring that all public announcements comply with legal requirements and are easily accessible to our residents.

PUBLIC RELATIONS: Our growing digital presence across platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, Twitter "X", and LinkedIn, provides real-time updates and information. We continue to expand our digital presence to maintain open lines of communication, promote community engagement, and commemorate Elorence's continued growth and success

city events management: The department plays a vital role in planning and executing city events, from parades and holiday celebrations to concerts all designed to bring the community together to enrich the lives of our residents in meaningful ways.

SAFETY AND RISK MANAGEMENT: Prioritizing the safety of the community and managing property and casualty risks, the Risk Manager safeguards the city against potential risks.

HUMAN SERVICES: Reflecting Florence's strong commitment to resident welfare and quality of life, the Human Services Administrator has introduced impactful programs, including the Good Neighbor Program, which connects volunteers with residents needing assistance. Current priorities include a close partnership with the Boone County Fiscal Court to tackle homelessness within our community and ensuring the responsible and impactful distribution of funds from the national opioid settlement. These funds are strategically directed toward addiction prevention and recovery resources, offering sustainable support for those affected by the crisis. Together, these initiatives underscore Florence's proactive commitment to fostering a healthier, more supportive environment for all residents, setting a foundation for lasting

HUMAN RESOURCES: Supporting Florence's dedicated workforce, the Human Resources Coordinator oversees recruitment, employee development, benefits administration, and policy compliance. By focusing on employee well-being, we maintain a supportive work environment that emphasizes growth and retention.

In 2024, the City of Florence Finance
Department achieved a remarkable
milestone, earning the Distinguished
Budget Award from the Government
Finance Officers Association for the
nineteenth consecutive year. This
prestigious recognition highlights the
department's dedication to excellence
and its crucial role in upholding the city's
financial stability and prosperity.

The department is committed to delivering timely and accurate financial support to all city departments and officials, always striving for efficiency and fiscal responsibility. This foundation of sound financial management is essential to the city's fiscal health and helping create a vibrant and prosperous city that appeals to both residents and businesses.

This year also marked a significant transition within the department. After over two decades of dedicated service, the long-serving CFO/HR director retired leaving behind a legacy of financial stewardship that has greatly contributed to the city's success. Her leadership and commitment to excellence will be missed. With her retirement, the role of Finance Director has been entrusted to a new leader, Jason Lewis, whose expertise and vision ensure that the department



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FY 2023-2024 ACTUAL AMOUNTS

The assets and deferred outflows of resources of the City exceeded its liabilities and deferred inflows at the close of the most recent fiscal year by \$217,115,018 (net position). Of this amount, \$70,501,349 (unrestricted net position) may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors. As of the close of the current fiscal year, the City's governmental funds reported a combined ending fund balance of \$111,705,414. This was a decrease of \$1,260,935 in comparison to the prior year. The decrease was a combination of the City's General Fund, Municipal Aid Fund, Asset Forfeiture and Aquatic Center Fund.





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FY 2024-2025 BUDGETED AMOUNTS

The projected revenues for all funds total \$72,947,500 and the projected expenditure for all funds totals \$74,988,341. The projected revenues for FY 2025 represent a .10% decrease under the amended revenues from the FY 2024 budget. Increases have been made in property tax revenue, payroll taxes, insurance premiums and interest income revenue in the general fund. The projected expenditures for FY 2025 represent a 19.99% decrease under the amended expenditures for the FY 2024 budget. The overall decrease is a result of the reduction of capital outlay expenditures in the General Fund outpacing the increase in personnel expenditures with the hiring of sixteen additional, an increase in the health and dental costs and a 3.2% Cost of Living Allowance (COLA). At the end of the previous fiscal year, the City's government funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$112,966,349, a decrease of \$3,314,285 in comparison with the prior year

Since its founding in 1936, the Florence Fire/EMS Department has remained dedicated to protecting the Florence community and Florence Fire Protection District. In 2024, our team achieved new milestones in service, recognition and growth.

This year, Florence Fire/EMS personnel received several accolades, including recognition from St. Elizabeth Medical Center for record stroke response times, the Mission Lifeline Award from the American Heart Association, and the "Preceptor of the Year" award from Gateway Community and Technical College. These honors reflect our dedication to providing exceptional emergency care.

In response to the growing demand, we upgraded our fleet with two new ambulances. We also received a generous donation from Marathon Refinery in Ashland, Kentucky: a 1926 American LaFrance Fire Engine. Residents can look forward to seeing this historic fire engine in the Memorial Day Parade and various city events.



Our team saw new members joining, as well as significant promotions and retirements. With deep gratitude, we bid farewell to our Assistant Fire/EMS Chief who retired after nearly 30 years of dedicated service. At the same time, we welcomed a new Assistant Fire/EMS Chief and introduced a Battalion Chief of Emergency Medical Services and paramedic only position to our department. These changes will bolster our training programs and elevate the quality of our services..

Our administrative team focused on Incident Management Team (IMT) classes, preparing our team for major emergencies and hazardous responses. One of the most significant achievements has been the construction of the new state-of-the-art fire station on Dream Street. Set to be completed in Spring of 2025, this station will enhance our ability to respond swiftly to emergencies and symbolizes our ongoing dedication to community safety.

Looking ahead to 2025, the department remains steadfast in its mission to protect and serve the community. We are committed to continuing our tradition of excellence in public health and safety for both residents and visitors alike.

Founded in 1958, the Florence Police Department has grown significantly and remains deeply involved in community events and outreach.

Annual activities include the DEA Drug Takeback, Stuff the Cruiser charity events, Easter Event, the Police Citizen Academy and all city events. The department also engages with young people through programs such as the Youth in Government, Senior Exit Interviews at Boone County High School and teaching D.A.R.E. to nearly all the city's elementary schools, including parochial schools.

The department's community outreach extends to participation in the Habitat for Humanity Customer Service Event, the Law Enforcement Memorial Service in Northern Kentucky, and recruiting events at both Eastern Kentucky University and University of Cincinnati. Additionally, the department offers businesses "Run, Hide, Fight" active shooter response classes and safety walk-through inspections upon request.



This year, the department hosted several Department of Criminal Justice Training (DCOJT) in-service classes, enhancing officers' skills and readiness. They welcomed 10 new hires, while 5 officers, including the Chief of Police, retired after years of dedicated service. Significant promotions have occurred, including the appointment of Florence native Chief Mallery as the new Chief of Police. Additionally, members of the department were honored for their outstanding achievements. Officer Jacobs received the 2023 MADD DUI Enforcement Award and the 2024 Governor's Impaired Driving Award, while Officer Pinkston was awarded the 2024 Occupant Safety Award.

The department received a generous donation of 20 AED units from Project Heart ReStart, further enhancing their ability to respond to medical emergencies.

The Florence Police Department remains committed to its core mission of preserving the public peace and protecting the well-being of the community, while continually adapting to meet modern needs.

The Florence Public Service Department is dedicated to supporting and enhancing the quality of life for residents, businesses, and visitors alike. Its commitment to community service, infrastructure management, and technological advancements drives their initiatives that serve Florence today and prepare us for future growth.

The Infrastructure Support Services (I.S.S.) Division, oversees capital improvement projects, regulatory compliance, asset management, automated metering infrastructure and GIS technology. This team manages the city's transportation network, parks, water and sewer systems, and stormwater infrastructure.

The Community Support Services Division (C.S.S.) administers city ordinances, property maintenance code, zoning regulations, and occupational license enforcement handling over 3,000 enforcement actions annually. Additionally, they remove over 2,500 illegal signs from public rights-of-way, conduct post-site plan reviews, and utilize GIS mapping software.

The Public Services Department strives to fulfill Florence's evolving needs and ensure a well-maintained, connected, and beautiful community.

The Operations Division, comprising of six divisions, is responsible for building maintenance, fleet maintenance, transportation, grounds, sanitary sewer and water, and is the backbone of Florence's daily upkeep. Operations runs a 24/7 on-call system, enabling rapid responses to emergencies such as water main breaks and severe weather events. This division's efforts are complemented by new equipment such as a mini excavator, improving operational safety and efficiency.

The Public Services Department is community focused. The department recently developed a drinking water service line inventory and inspection for safety compliance and launched Procore for project management. Looking ahead, the department has a comprehensive plan for the coming year, prioritizing infrastructure improvements, technological upgrades and community enhancement. Community focused projects like the Boone County Veterans Memorial reconstruction, Dream Street Fire Station completion and the Aquatic Center and Parks Master Plans, the department aims to enhance public facilities and amenities.

Florence/Boone County Skate Park

The Florence/Boone County Skate Park is an impressive 22,000 square foot park designed for in-line skates, roller blades and skateboards. One of the most appealing aspects of the Florence/Boone County Skate Park is its thoughtful design, catering to a range of skill levels. The park has areas for beginners, intermediate and advanced areas with various challenging elements. Beyond the terrain, the park has a shelter and spectator area for friends and family to watch their favorite skater. There is no fee to enter, so grab your skates or board, invite your friends, and experience the thrill of the only concrete skate park in our area.



Florence Community Plaza

The Florence Community Plaza Park is a memorial park to recognize the public servants who have served the citizens of the City of Florence. The land was donated in 2016 by Tom Green for the sole purpose of serving the community. As you explore the park, you will find statutes paying homage to our Police, Fire/EMS, Public Services and Administration Departments, each a testament to their selfless service to our city. The brick pavers encircling the park bear the names of those retiring public employees, forever etching their legacy into the foundation of our community.

All Florence city parks are open daily from dawn to dusk.



Florence Nature Park: A Natural Oasis

With 15 acres, the Florence Nature Park stands out with its picturesque walking trails and the Evelyn M. Kalb Gathering House and Nature Park Event Center located off Banklick Street. Acquired by the city in 1986, this park is not only a nature lovers dream, but also a perfect place for hosting indoor events. The Florence Nature Park has paved walking trails for exploring nature with over 2,800 linear feet of asphalt walking trails. The granite animals in the park were donated by the Florence Mall when the park was under construction.

For your indoor events, the Evelyn M. Kalb Gathering House and Nature Park Event Center offer a cozy setting for events and rentals, making it an excellent choice for weddings, meetings, and special occasions.

Tours of the facility are conducted by appointment.



Kentaboo Park

Sports enthusiasts can head to Lincoln Woods Park, where you will find baseball fields, tennis courts, and a basketball court. The land for this park was acquired by the city in 1959 as part of the water treatment plant land acquisition. This 15-acre park was developed in 1972 into an active park and is the perfect park for both organized sports events and casual pick-up games. Additionally, a colorful playground ensures the kids have a blast while you enjoy your favorite sports, and a wooded area with dirt trails keeps you connected to nature.

Niblack Memorial Park

7431 U.S. 42

Niblack Memorial Park is a 4.5-acre neighborhood park on the site of the former city building. Providing a large green space and walking trail, the park is conveniently located next to the Deanna and Hugh Skees Senior Activity Center.



Orleans Park

8400 ST. LOUIS BOULEVARD

Acquired in 2002, Fischer Development donated 9.5 acres and the city purchased an adjoining 1.5 acres to make this an active 11-acre park. Situated in the Orleans North subdivision on the west side of the city, the park features a playground, basketball court, green open space for an athletic field, sand volleyball court, asphalt paved walking trail, and

walking bridge leading to a sled hill for those winter months! For fishing enthusiasts, bring your pole and catch a few fish in the stocked lake following the catch and release rule.



South Fork Park

9200 SOUTH FORK PARK DRIVE

If you are looking for some outdoor adventure and recreation, South Fork Park is the place to be. South Fork Park is our largest city park encompassing 42 acres and is home to our nine-hole disc golf course. The beautifully landscaped sand volleyball courts and well-maintained concrete basketball courts are sure to fill your day with plenty of exercise. For those seeking a more peaceful experience, the walking path features natural wooded and meadow areas. Our pedestrian bridge, which crosses over Gunpowder Creek, is a favorite for family photos. The calm, picturesque scene, punctuated by the sounds of nature, creates a haven for relaxation and meditation. The mounded earthen sculpture along the walking path, is constructed of topsoil and ideal for sledding on snow days!



Stringtown Park

7340 BURLINGTON PIKE

Acquired by the city in 2001, Stringtown Park is a city favorite, featuring basketball courts for those looking to shoot some hoops, as well as a playground area where kids can burn off energy and parents can relax. The park features an open green space, sand volleyball court, asphalt paved trail and two concrete cornhole sets.



Stringtown Tennis Courts

Located near the Boone County High School campus, these tennis courts were recently upgraded and now feature fresh tennis court striping, along with new pickleball striping added this year.



Your Guide to Boards & Commissions

Citizen participation is a vital aspect of good government. Florence boasts nine diverse boards and commissions, each focused on various aspects of community life.

These boards and commissions provide opportunities for you to directly influence our community's direction. If you are interested in any of these boards or commissions, we encourage you to apply.

Here is a glimpse of what each one entails:



AVIATION NOISE ABATEMENT COMMITTEE

This committee is a regional advisory committee to the Kenton County Airport Board working to mitigate the aviation-related noises and other quality of life issues within the city.



BOONE COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION

The city appoints six members to the commission which plays a crucial role in local land-use planning, zoning regulations and subdivision regulations.



BOONE-FLORENCE BOARD OF ASSESSMENT AND APPEALS

The city appoints one member of the board which considers appeals of property owners disagreeing with the assessment of their property.



BOONE-FLORENCE WATER COMMISSION

The city appoints one member of the commission which operates, improves, extends, supervises, manages, and controls sources of water supply to the City of Florence and Boone County Water District.



BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT AND ZONING APPEALS

Empowered to grant condition use permits and dimensional variances from zoning regulations within the city.



CODE ENFORCEMENT BOARD

The board hears appeals such as property maintenance violations, zoning violations and parking citations enforcing local codes and regulations to maintain community standards.



NORTHERN KENTUCKY REGIONAL ETHICS COMMITTEE

The city is a part of the Northern Kentucky Regional Ethics Authority which was created through an Interlocal Agreement and promotes ethical practices in local government.



URBAN FOREST COMMISSION

Focuses on the preservation, maintaining and expanding of our urban green spaces.



VETERANS COMMISSION

Dedicated to addressing issues that affect our local veterans.

FLORENCE'S ESSENTIAL SERVICES

Florence stands as a shining example of a community that values its residents' well-being. With efficient snow removal, a top-notch recycling center, biannual cleanups, and cost-effective garbage rates through Rumpke, Florence ensures that its residents have access to essential services that make daily life easier and more enjoyable. In Florence, quality living is not just a slogan, it is a way of life.

SNOW REMOVAL ON CITY STREETS

When winter blankets Florence in snow, the Public Services Department is ready to keep roads safe and clear.

During a snow emergency, residents can help by moving parked vehicles off streets when snow is expected. Florence has one level of snow emergency, announced via social media, radio and news outlets. During a snow emergency, all on-street parking is prohibited for 24 hours to allow crews to clear the streets efficiently.

GARBAGE AND RECYCLING PROGRAMS

GARBAGE COLLECTION

Rumpke is the authorized provider in Florence to provide low-cost garbage collection services. This agreement allows residents to enjoy high-quality waste removal services without breaking the bank. Affordable garbage rates make it easier for families to maintain a clean and healthy living environment. To initiate service at your residence or business, call Rumpke at 877.786.7537.

RECYCLING PICK-UP

The City of Florence offers a voluntary subscription recycling program for Florence residents, also through Rumpke. Residents are billed directly from Rumpke for this service and resident curbside pickup occurs on the same day as your trash pickup.

Our contract does not include commercial and industrial recycling but Rumpke does offer this service. Please contact Rumpke at 877.786.7537 for commercial and industrial rates or to set up service.

RECYCLING DROP-OFF

Florence takes pride in its commitment to sustainability and offers a drop-off recycling program at the city's Recycling Center. Located at the Public Services Maintenance Facility, 7850 Tanners Lane, residents can drop off recyclables such as paper, cardboard, plastic, glass, and more, making it easy to reduce waste and promote ecofriendly practices. ANNUAL SPRING AND FALL CLEAN UP


Florence residents and businesses can take advantage of the Fall and Spring Clean Up events.

This is an opportunity to declutter homes and yards by disposing of large items and excess waste. These community-wide cleanups not only help keep Florence beautiful but also promote a sense of pride and cooperation among residents. The program lasts one week and is an opportunity for Florence residents (must show proof of

residency) to bring unwanted debris for disposal at the Public Services Maintenance Facility located at 7850 Tanners Lane.

Debris that will not be accepted includes tires, paint (in liquid form), batteries, antifreeze, oil, insecticides, pesticides and fungicides (hazardous waste).

Proof of residency required. Facility hours are 7 a.m. 7 p.m.





FOR RESIDENTS

ANNUAL LEAF COLLECTION

The Florence Public Services Department performs their annual Leaf Collection Program from mid-October to mid-December for City of Florence residents. All leaves are treated and used as compost or fertilizer. A sign will be placed at the subdivision/ street entrances at least one week prior to actual pickup day.

GUIDELINES FOR COLLECTION

- Rake leaves in a row behind the curb. Do not rake in the street. Leaves need to be raked to the curb by 7 a.m. the morning of the scheduled pickup listed on the schedule.
- Pickup is on residential streets only and not on state routes or commercial streets.
- Keep all debris and trash out of the leaf row. This includes tree branches, tomato plants, and landscape debris.
- Homeowners may still also leave bags for pickup by Rumpke.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

Wondering what to do with your live tree after the holidays? The city offers curbside tree pickup during which crews from the Public Services Department will drive around the city and pick up Christmas trees curbside for recycling.

City of Street Street Map Index

When you hit the road in Florence, have you ever wondered if you are driving on a city, county, or state road? Understanding these distinctions can be especially helpful when reporting maintenance issues. Here's a brief overview:

CITY ROADS

These roads are maintained by the local city or municipality and are typically found within city limits. Examples of roads maintained by the City of Florence include Farmview Drive, Wellington Blvd., Bustetter Drive, and Mall Road.

COUNTY ROADS

Managed by the county government, these roads connect areas outside city limits, serving as connectors between cities, and rural regions within the county. A few examples are Aero Parkway, Camp Ernst Road, and Cayton Road.

STATE ROADS

State roads, also known as highways, are under state government jurisdiction and often connect regions within the state, spanning across multiple cities and counties. Examples of state-maintained roads are KY 18, US 42, Hopeful Church Road, Houston Road, Weaver Road, Turfway Road, and Dixie Highway.

Being able to differentiate between these road types is crucial when reporting maintenance concerns to the appropriate authorities. It ensures that the right government agency is informed, leading to a more effective response and quicker resolution of road-related issues.
